Looking Back and Looking Forward...

e are midway through a year-long, citywide needs assessment compiling input from people living and working throughout Newark to determine the city's most pervasive unmet needs, as well as

untapped resources and un-integrated efforts. We have looked very broadly at identifying Newark's critical issues that are insufficiently addressed by present resources and strategies. We interviewed 50 key civic and community

leaders, surveyed over 500 Newark residents, collected and mapped existing research and data.

During the next phase, we plan to drill down deeper into some areas that

emerged as most critical. These will include issues related to workforce and economic development, police and community relations, and individuals' and organizations' access to information about available services. We will gather input from a broader sample of the population through open community forums, citywide surveys (block by block), and focus groups. Throughout this process, we are developing collaborative solutions through maximizing resources and talents already here in Newark and also identifying best practices with promise from other cities.

he Center for Collaborative Change is an innovative organization that employs a simple process to bring transformative change to the City of Newark. Because people who live and work in a community have the best insights into its challenges, for any new solution to be successfully adopted, those community members need to take part in and lead these transformative efforts. We work with community members to map and identify Newark's most pressing problems as well as untapped or underutilized resources, research policy and programmatic solutions that have worked elsewhere, and implement them in Newark in collaboration with policy-makers, local nonprofits, community leaders and others.
